

GUIDELINES FOR CITY BUSINESSES TO COMBAT THE SPREAD OF COVID-19



EXECUTIVE ORDER FROM GOVERNOR NORTHAM

1 DINING ESTABLISHMENTS
Dining and congregation areas in restaurants, dining establishments, food courts, breweries, microbreweries, distilleries, wineries, tasting rooms, and farmers markets are to close their dining areas. All establishments may continue to offer delivery, takeout, and curbside delivery.

2 RECREATION AND ENTERTAINMENT BUSINESSES
Recreation and entertainment areas and businesses such as theaters, museums, concerts, fitness centers, salons, spas, bowling alleys, escape rooms, and other places of indoor public amusement must close until Thursday, April 23, 2020.

3 NONESSENTIAL RETAILERS
Nonessential brick and mortar retailers are allowed to stay open but must limit all in-person shopping to 10 patrons or fewer. If a business cannot adhere to the 10 patron limit with social distancing requirements, they must close.

4 ESSENTIAL RETAILERS
Essential brick-and-mortar businesses such as health care, grocery stores, supply chain businesses, home improvement, hardware, and electronic may remain open during normal business hours and have to maintain social distancing with six feet between people. 
5 SOCIAL DISTANCING
All businesses to the extent possible should maintain 6 feet of distance from patrons and customers during interactions. Use methods such as tables, taped lines on floors, etc. to designate and create appropriate distance while carrying out interactions.

6 PATRONS PER ESTABLISHMENT
Nonessential retailers must limit all in-person shopping to no more than 10 patrons per establishment. If the limit cannot be adhered to, the business must close.
